STEPS TO TAKE

In The Event of a Serious Accident / Injury

- **#1)** Assess hazards Ensure there is no danger to you or others.
- **#2) Attend to the injured person.** Summon help to retrieve an Emergency Kit if possible. Do not leave a seriously injured person unattended.
 - **Provide first aid** to the best of your ability. Emergency Kits with Level-1 First Aid Kit, splints, heat packs, blankets, etc., along with a rescue toboggan, are located at each shelter, major trail junctions (see trail map) and near the equipment sheds behind the Viking Centre.
 - KEY ACTION: Keep the Injured Person Warm
 - Wrap the person in a fibre blanket and emergency blanket.
 - Insulate from snow contact.
- **#3)** When additional help is available, consider evacuating the injured person on a toboggan to the nearest trailhead, <u>only</u> if there is no risk of further injury.
- #4) Send someone for help and report back:
 - Ski to the nearest trailhead (Mud Lake or Glenmerry). Try to <u>locate a Club Fee Collector</u>, <u>Trail Groomer</u>, <u>or Ski Patroller</u>. If present, these personnel will have radio contact with each other. Fee Collectors and Trail Groomers will also have access to a satellite phone to call an ambulance, RCMP or Search & Rescue (through RCMP) or summon Club personnel to assist with rescue equipment.
 - <u>Send back assistance</u> to help with patient evacuation.
 - If available, Trail Groomers will be able to assist with evacuation using a snowmobile and rescue toboggan.
- **#5)** If Club personnel and a satellite phone are not on site; <u>dispatch someone</u> with a cell phone to make a 911 call and report back. It will be necessary for a volunteer to drive approx. 15-18 km. <u>towards Rossland</u> (on Highway 3B) until 911 cell phone coverage is obtained.
- **#6) When circumstances allow, report the incident to a Club Executive Member** (see contact information on enclosed Incident / Hazard Report form).

SATELLITE PHONE EMERGENCY CONTACT LIST

In the event of a serious injury, accident or other emergency, initiate telephone calls in the order below, using a Club satellite phone. If direct numbers for ambulance or RCMP are unsuccessful, call a Club Executive member to make a 911 call to request appropriate first responders (e.g., ambulance, police, search & rescue) and to send Club members to assist with a snowmobile and rescue toboggan.

(911 calls cannot be made directly from a satellite phone)

If a Satellite Phone is NOT Available:

Dispatch someone with a cell phone to call 911 and a Club representative and report back. It will be necessary for a volunteer to drive approx. 15-18 km. towards Rossland (on Highway 3B) until Cell phone coverage is obtained.

^{*} Channel 38 (LADD-3) is the selected channel for communication and safety use at the Paulson Cross Country Ski Trails, but may also have occasional trucker traffic.

Note: Radios are normally locked to the Club channel #38. To temporarily select another channel, unlock the radio by holding down the bottom right button (with lock symbol) on the keypad, then press the up or down keys.

^{**} As noted in the above table, several of the radio frequencies listed are not authorized for general public use but may be accessed in a serious emergency where another communication method (e.g., Sat Phone) is unsuccessful. Channel 16 (FS-Blue) connects to the Ministry of Forests' repeater. Call "XLW61 Arrow" for the Castlegar Office or "South East Fire Centre" and advise of the 911 emergency service (e.g., ambulance, police, rescue) required. In the winter this channel is generally monitored only during government office hours.
