

# About the Project

- Started by Columbia Basin Trust in 2008
- Led by Selkirk College since 2011 with funding from Columbia Basin Trust
- Columbia Basin-Boundary Region
  - 86,000 km<sup>2</sup>
  - 28 municipalities
  - 25 electoral areas
  - 167,000 residents



# Goal



To provide **access to data** that Columbia Basin-Boundary communities and organizations can use to **support evidence-based decision-making**, leading to **improved well-being** in the region.



# Objectives

## Inform

citizens and organizations about the people, natural environment, communities, and economy of the region by providing access to accurate, credible and timely information

## Encourage


understanding of complex issues and trends over time, including future projections when possible

## Signal

whether conditions are similar or different within the region, compare to other areas to highlight and celebrate areas of achievement, and to identify significant issues

## Motivate

discussion, information sharing, strategic evidence-based decisions, and collective action






# Municipal Spending on Parks, Recreation, and Culture

Percentage of total spending on parks, recreation, and culture

- **Parks:** Green spaces, trails, beaches, sports fields, golf courses, ski areas, and public squares.
- **Recreation:** Municipal recreation boards, and facilities such as swimming pools, skating rinks, curling rinks, gymnasiums, racquet courts, and exercise areas.
- **Culture:** Cultural boards, and facilities such as libraries, galleries, museums, community halls, performing arts theatres, and heritage conservation programs.


# Expressing Oneself Through Arts and Cultural Activities

# Tourism Brings Positive Benefits








# Attending Arts or Cultural Events

Average Score	5.3	4.6	5.3



# Pulling it All Together

Municipal spending on parks, recreation, and culture is stable (generally increasing from 2021 to 2022)

Residents perceive tourism as bringing positive benefits


